Nepean Housing Updates

Starting March 7, 2023, The Tenant Services Team will open up the office at 2 Hammill Court from 8:30 am – 10:00 am and 130 Centrepointe from 10:30 am – 12 noon. The office will be opened twice a month, the first Tuesday of each month and the last Tuesday of each month. Our staff will be available during these times to assist you with completing your annual rent reviews, collecting documents and answer any questions you may have. The schedule will be posted on the office door at both locations.

If you have a problem with bed bugs, cockroaches, or other insects or pests, please notify our office immediately. Early detection and reporting, as well as proper preparation and adherence to a treatment plan are key to controlling the problem. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.



One-Time Top-Up to the Canada Housing Benefit

The Government of Canada is providing a one-time payment of \$500 to lower-income renters to help with the cost of rent.

The benefit is available to renters who:

- Have an adjusted family net income of \$35,000 or less for families, or \$20,000 or less for individuals
- Are at least 15 years of age and their principal residence is in Canada on December 1, 2022
- Pay at least 30 per cent of their 2021 adjusted family net income on rent in 2022.

Applications can be made through your CRA My Account. To get your payment faster, register for direct deposit in CRA My Account. An online web form is available if you are unable to sign into, or register for a CRA My Account. Applicants who are unable to apply online can call the CRA at 1-800-282-8079.

Applications close on March 31, 2023.

- be enrolled in a program at a college, university, or private trade school for the 2023-2024 school year (or program equivalent)

Winter is Here!

Snow Removal Parking Spots

Just a friendly reminder that tenants are responsible for ensuring that all ice and snow is cleared on driveways, car ports, parking spaces, steps, and landings. Our snow removal companies will be looking at main road ways and sidewalks. For the safety of yourself, your family and guests, all residents of garden homes should have an abrasive (salt, sand, de-icer) and a shovel.

Remember that the saltboxes in the communities are the property of the snow removal company and are not to be used by tenants.

Snow Removal Winter Weather Parking Bans

Snow removal is particularly difficult on roadways where vehicles remain parked after a large snow fall. Between November 15 and April 1, the City may declare a Winter Weather Parking Ban for inclement weather including freezing rain or when Environment Canada forecasts 7 cm or more of snow in the Ottawa area. This includes any forecast for a range of snow more than 7 cm, such as 5 to 10 cm. The Winter Weather Parking Ban will be called to support clearing operations and will continue until the City issues a notice that it has been lifted.

When a winter weather parking ban is called, the City issues a special advisory to the local media and posts it on ottawa.ca.

Vehicles without a residential parking permit that are parked on the street during a parking ban may be ticketed and towed.

Nepean Housing Snow Dumps Visitor Parking Winter

Some visitor parking spots are dedicated snow dumps during the months of November through April, and they must be kept clear. Do not risk damage to your vehicle or a parking ticket – do not park in designated snow storage areas! Remember that street (and lane) parking during the winter months and anywhere there is a "No Parking" sign will result in a ticket. Please DO NOT BLOCK any parking spaces! Please also heed visitor parking registration requirements during posted hours.



Don't be Frozen Out!

With colder weather comes the possibility of frozen pipes. Make sure the heat in your unit remains above 15 degrees so that pipes will not freeze. We've seen the result of this, and, besides the mess and loss of property, the cost to repair is substantial. Check your insurance policy to ensure this peril is covered.

The Heat is ON!

High-efficiency furnaces require different exterior venting, and that venting is lower to the ground. This means that snow MUST be kept clear from the pipes. If snow piles up against the outlet, your furnace will shut down, and you will lose your heat. "No Heat" calls for this reason can result in a charge to you! Please ensure all vent pipes are kept clear this winter. Also remember that many furnaces have a switch (similar to a light switch) that must be in the ON position for the furnace to work.

Furnace Filters

Clogged filters cause your furnace to operate less efficiently, costing more money in fuel and reducing the quality of the air you breathe. Replace your filters once a month during the heating season. Furnace filters can be bought at most hardware stores. In your basement, please be sure to keep a 4-foot clear radius around your furnace, gas hot water tank and electrical panel to minimize fire hazards.

Propane tanks and storage

There can be only one propane tank per unit, at a time, and it must be attached to a barbeque. Additional propane tanks cannot be stored inside the unit or inside of a shed. The Technical Standards Safety Association states that tanks must be in a chain link fenced area similar to a propane tank fueling station. In your basement, please be sure to keep a four-foot clear radius around your furnace, gas hot water tank and electrical panel to minimize fire hazards
